



Recognizing the important role that bees, butterflies, birds, wasps and other pollinators play in our food system, healthy gardens and thriving forests, WGC supports local community organizations working to aid these pollinators. We have been supporting pollinator projects at [21 Acres](#) since 2019. With [BeeVesting](#) our members coordinated Mason Bees deliveries to farmers in the Sammamish Valley. Currently, the [Pollinator Project](#) is rejuvenating the Spiral Herb Garden and expanding the Pollinator Demonstration Garden, both onsite at 21 Acres in downtown Woodinville. These projects support the bigger goal of increasing bio-diversity in our community by creating a system of pollinator-friendly plant corridors, habitat for the native pollinators, in Woodinville and throughout the area.
